- Construction and operation of various supply-side resources, including fossil-fueled power plants, nuclear plants, hydroelectric dams, and renewable resources
- Development and management of demand-side resources, including energy efficiency
- Design, construction, and operation of power delivery systems
- The integration of all of these energy resources into plans for meeting future demands for electricity in the TVA region






TVA's Approach to Sustainability





High-Level Guidehouse Sustainability FAC Survey Results


- Most respondents reported that their organizations are very engaged with sustainability (average: 4.2 / 5), that they are very aware of TVA sustainability programs (4.4 / 5), and that their stakeholder group is very aligned with TVA sustainability priorities (4.1 / 5).
- The sustainability issues frequently reported as most important to respondents' stakeholder groups were reliability and resilience (7 responses), decarbonization (7), diversity and inclusion (5), and biodiversity and habitat conservation (4).
- 7 out of 11 respondents identified the availability of funding, human resources, and/or time as a major challenge in building their organization's sustainability program. Other frequently identified challenges were navigating legislation or politics (3 responses) and generating stakeholder buy-in (2).




High-Level Guidehouse Sustainability FAC Survey Results

- Respondents feel that TVA is making strides in decarbonization (5), reliability and diversity of the generation mix (3), natural resources conservation, and electric vehicle deployment; but several of these topics are also frequently mentioned as areas in which TVA could push further.
 - Overall, responses indicate that FAC stakeholders believe that TVA is doing well in sustainability but that there is an opportunity to do more.
- Common responses to questions regarding feedback from stakeholders and collaboration needs indicate improved outreach, education, and engagement as an opportunity for TVA. Outreach could improve the accessibility of sustainabilityrelated programs and address concerns that renewables will impact energy cost and reliability.



TVA's Mission to Serve

- Founded in 1933 as part of the New Deal
- Non-profit Federal Corporation, the nation's largest Public Power provider
- Since its inception, TVA has worked to make life better for the people of the Tennessee Valley region.







History of the Tennessee Valley and the TVA

Before the TVA Act was signed in 1933, poverty devasted the lives of those within the Tennessee Valley. The region was subject to continual flooding of the Tennessee River which was non-navigable.

Decades of poor crop management exhausted the soil, resulting in erosion, nutrient depletion, and plunging crop yields.

Annual per capita annual income was only \$168--about 45 percent of the national average (TVA, 2022)










Today...

- Power reliability at 99.999%

- Manages 290k+ acres of public land
- Manages the Tennessee River System to minimize flood damage and for recreation, water quality and navigation

Meaningful Involvement

- People have an opportunity to participate in decisions about activities that may affect their environment and/or health;
- The public's contribution can influence the regulatory agency's decision;
- Community concerns will be considered in the decision-making process; and
- Decision makers will seek out and facilitate the involvement of those potentially affected (<u>EPA</u> <u>2022a</u>).

Fair Treatment

 No group of people should bear a disproportionate share of the negative environmental consequences resulting from industrial, governmental and commercial operations or policies (EPA 2022a).

The Justice 40 Initiative was created by Executive Order 14008 under President Joe Biden on January 27, 2021.

Goal that at least 40 percent of the overall benefits from certain federal investments flow to disadvantaged communities.

Areas of investments include:

- Climate Change
- Clean energy and energy efficiency
- Clean transit
- Affordable and sustainable housing

- Training and workforce development
- Remediation and reduction of legacy pollution
- Development of critical clean water infrastructure



What is a disadvantaged community?

A disadvantaged community may include one or more of the following variables (list is not inclusive of all variable to be considered):

- Low income; high persistent poverty
- High unemployment or underemployment
- High housing cost burden and/or substandard housing
- High transportation burden and/or low transportation access

- High energy cost burden and low energy access*
- Disproportionate impacts from climate change
- Access to healthcare
- Job lost through the energy transition





Verifying impacts

Funding research to quantify non-energy benefits will show the positive health impacts on Home Uplift participants.



Quantifying effects on social determinants of health (SDH)



TVA is working to measure Home Uplift outcomes beyond traditional utility EM&V



Knoxville-based research firm Three³ has studied the program's effects on SDH



SDH studied include asthma, COPD, thermal stress, trade-offs to paying energy bills, and quality of life

Three³ Preliminary Findings

- Households no longer worry about having to heat or cool their homes
- Exposure to extreme temperatures was significantly reduced after the upgrades: 40% reduction to heat and 37% reduction to cold
- The total number of medical interventions for participants decreased more than the control group at a statistically significant level

- Adjusting deposit policies
- Training staff at all levels to understand and implement changes to all customers







Future TVA activities

- Work with State of Tennessee to link study participants with TennCare claims for actual healthcare interactions and costs
- Research Home Uplift Program SDOH in Tennessee's distressed rural counties, including TennCare data
- Guide LPCs and community-based organizations to further Home Uplift's reach
- Create a partner portal and online application
