




What is a Natural Area?

Natural areas are places dominated by native vegetation that have various levels of potential for harboring high quality natural resources and unique features

TVA has 157 natural areas covering 15,900 acres

- Small Wild Areas SWA
- Ecological Study Areas ESA
- Habitat Protection Areas HPA
- Wildlife Observation Areas WOA



Outdoor Recreation

- Provide low impact recreation
- Trails, overlooks, primitive campsites, and national recreation trails (designated within TVA natural areas)
- Hiking, bird-watching, wildlife viewing


NRP Objectives for Natural Areas

- Monitoring schedule was developed to monitor and assess TVA's natural areas using a prioritized list of maintenance or improvement needs (assess approximately 1/3 of natural areas annually)
- Program Guidelines were developed that provide a framework for comprehensive natural area management plans (15 per year)
- Natural Area designation criteria tool and process was developed to designate new, make additions to, or remove existing natural areas on TVA-managed lands




