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Construction Update: Neighbors to Benefit From Sound and Light Barriers

In an effort to ease the impact of construction on our neighbors, we will be erecting sound and light barriers on top of Boone Dam's earthen embankment. "We are trying to minimize the impact of our around-the-clock construction work on the surrounding homes by building the sound barrier," said Construction Manager Kevin Holbrook. Kevin says the tan, fabric wall will be 16 feet high, 900 feet long and will run the length of the earthen embankment. It will be 4-6 feet wide. The photo at left, taken during last week's media update, shows an overview of the work on top of the earthen embankment.

Boone Project Manager: "On Schedule for Five to Seven Year Timeline"

Project Manager Sam Vinson (right, during a media interview at the new beach) told reporters the project remains on schedule for the five-seven year timeline. "Safety is always our overriding priority and the actions we take every day are intended to help ensure the safety of the public as well as our own team members," Sam said. "The Boone Project remains on schedule to safely complete the proposed repair in the 2020-2022 timeframe, as discussed during the July 2015 public meeting."

A secondary goal is to promote the benefits dams offer to communities.
