

Tennessee Valley Clean Marina Program

The Tennessee Valley Authority created this program to support and recognize marina operators and owners who are voluntarily striving to protect the water resources of the Tennessee Valley and to promote environmentally responsible marina and boating practices. This program is a way for TVA to recognize those marinas that go a step further to protect the water resource and ensure clean water is available to future generations.



This program scores marinas on seven topic areas. In each of the categories listed below, a marina must complete 75% of the recommended actions in order to be considered for certification:

Sewage Management

Raw or improperly treated sewage contains an assortment of pathogens, chemicals and nutrients, many of which pose a serious threat to human health and the aquatic environment.

Fuel Management

Spilled fuel creates a barrier to oxygen movement across the water surface, coats the leaves of aquatic plants, discolors boat hulls and dock supports, and deteriorates Styrofoam.®

Solid Waste and Petroleum Recycling/Disposal

Trash and litter can be environmentally damaging and aesthetically displeasing.

Vessel Operation, Maintenance and Repair

Debris, drips and spills from vessel cleaning, maintenance and repair can end up in the water when it rains or snows. Paint chips, metal filings, petroleum products and cleaning solvents can be toxic to aquatic life.

Marina Siting, Design and Maintenance

Locating marina structures so that they take advantage of existing water and wind currents and natural topography can make property maintenance easier.

Stormwater Management and Control

Storm runoff from parking lots, maintenance and repair areas, and shorelines transports many pollutants to the lake. Some float on the water, and some sink, but they all impact the aquatic environment.

Public Education

A boating public that understands the causes, sources and effects of pollution is more likely to want clean water to play in.

How to get certified

Ninety marinas have been certified since the start of the program in 2002. Certification is good for two years until renewal. After the first renewal, recertification is required every four years.

Has your certification lapsed? Not sure? Check our website – all currently certified marinas are listed – or review your certificate. Are you interested in getting your certification renewed, or have you never been certified and would like to be?

The process is easy – just give us a call. You can find the guidebook and checklist on our website. If you are really pressed for time, we will fill your checklist out for you – it takes about two hours. More than likely you are already doing many of the actions on the checklist, so don't think it will cost you a lot to be certified. If you have questions, let us know.

Make the Switch

Did you know there is a special day designated for cutting energy cost? The purpose is to remind you to look at lifestyle changes that can reduce your energy consumption and consequently lower your utility bills. What better time to make life changes than at the beginning of the year?

One simple thing you can do is switch from incandescent bulbs to LED lighting. This alone could save \$40 per year. LED bulbs may cost more, but they will last 30 times longer. They are energy-efficient and ecologically friendly, because they are toxin-free and recyclable. Another neat thing about LED bulbs is that they emit very little heat, so they don't get too hot to touch.

If you are interested in receiving other cost-saving tips, contact your local power company to schedule a TVA EnergyRight Energy Audit. A professional will inspect your insulation, appliances and lighting, and then provide a detailed report explaining where you can save money. The process is simple, and most times, it's free.

Biodiversity Matters

World Wetlands Day has been observed internationally since 1997. It celebrates how wetlands, which are lands saturated by water, help maintain diversity on Earth. Wetlands provide benefits to people, fish and wildlife. Environmentalists estimate that 40% of all species live or breed in wetlands. Wetlands are important because they improve water quality, provide habitat for fish and wildlife, and help prevent flooding by absorbing the water.

Wetlands occur in all 50 states. One way to determine a wetland is through the presence of cattails. Cattails are commonly associated with wetlands because they are typically found along the shoreline in marshy areas. Federal law prohibits the destruction of this habitat on federal lands, and there may be incentives for private owners who are interesting in preserving their wetlands.

There are five ways to help protect wetlands:

- 1) Maintain a buffer strip of native plants along streams and wetlands.
- 2) Minimize the use of pesticides and fertilizers.
- 3) Avoid non-native and invasive plant species.
- 4) Deter storm water runoff and don't pollute.
- 5) Keep pets under control.



It's important that wetlands not be disturbed, so that they can perform as nature intended.

Sharing Is Caring

World Wildlife Day is an important day to raise awareness of the diversity of wildlife and marine life that we have today. With increasing numbers of endangered and extinct species, it is crucial to educate people on how we can help preserve the planet to continue to provide for future generations.

As the human population increases, development can wreak havoc on the natural habitat for wildlife. To ensure a balance, it's important to take that extra step to create wildlife habitat. Compost piles and building of birdhouses are two ways to help create space for wildlife.

Leaves, pine needles and other natural debris provides protective covering for the soil and food for animals. After decomposition, they produce organic matter in the soil that supports plant life and enhances water retention. Compost material reduces the need for chemical fertilizers.



Birdhouses are called nesting boxes and provide a safe place for birds to build their nests, protected from the elements and predators. Adding a birdhouse to your property also provides an educational opportunity as you attract target species to your area.

Your Life Depends on It

National Safe Boating week is May 22-28, 2021. During this time, take a moment to freshen up on the responsible boating skills and commit to wearing a life jacket whenever on the water.

If you enjoy water sports, knowing how to swim is a great skill to possess. However, the U.S. Coast Guard reported that two-thirds of the drownings that occurred in 2019 were among good swimmers. Accidents happen in an instant, and it's difficult to predict what can happen in the open waters when you cannot see what's lurking below the surface.

Wearing a life jacket is a preventive measure that may not be fashionable or cool, but is designed to save lives if you are wearing it properly. Having it on board is good, but wearing it is best. If something happened in an instant, as accidents do, would you have time to get your life jacket and snap it on before hitting the water, most likely in a panic?

Take a Hike

Since 1993, the American Hiking Society (AHS) has designated the first Saturday in June as National Trails Day, a time to recognize and appreciate the benefits that federal, state and local trails provide to the public. TVA recognizes the importance of trails and celebrates the American Hiking Society's National Trails Day with volunteer trail workdays, guided hikes or bike rides, and cleanups

Outdoor events are held throughout the U.S. to provide opportunities for participation in trail maintenance, new trail dedications, educational events, and instructional workshops, all designed to promote awareness of the features that trail systems offer. These include walking, hiking, running, biking, birdwatching, geocaching, plant observation, and access to waterways for canoeing and paddling. This is a great time of year to gather volunteers and recruit new ones.

- There are more than 170 miles of trails on TVA public land, and TVA is adding more trails every year. Almost all trail building is performed in winter, when the leaves are off the trees, because it is easier to see the landscape and to design features that make for a sustainable trail—for example, to plan for water drainage patterns.
- TVA values our trails, and our National Trails Day objective is to help connect local communities to their public lands and trails by enhancing skills and opportunities for volunteering, and encouraging recreation and conservation.

The Vital 1%

The Tennessee River Valley is a watershed filled with creeks, rivers and streams. Those waters provide great recreation opportunities and help generate power. Those waters are used to grow our food and manufacture products, but, most essentially, those creeks, rivers and streams provide our drinking water. When you look over the Valley, water appears to be plentiful. However, only 1% of the water on Earth is fresh water. It is critical to conserve the water that sustains human, plant and animal life. Here are a few water-saving measures that can have a big impact as you look at ways to cut your energy costs:

1. Turn off the faucet while brushing your teeth.
2. Run the washing machine and dishwasher only when you have a full load.
3. Use a low-flow showerhead and faucet aerators.
4. Fix leaks. Even a small drip can waste 50 or more gallons of water a day.
5. Install a dual-flush or low-flow toilet or put a conversion kit on your existing toilet.
6. Don't overwater your lawn or water during peak periods, and install rain sensors on irrigation systems.
7. Install a rain barrel for outdoor watering.
8. Plant a rain garden for catching stormwater runoff from your roof, driveway and other hard surfaces.
9. Monitor your water usage on your water bill and ask your local government about a home water audit.
10. Share with your neighbors your knowledge about saving water through conservation and efficiency.

Keep It Natural

Take a moment to consider how important a clean lake is to your recreation experience. Would you still use it if it were polluted? What about the animals that use its water for survival – what would they do? When it comes to using cleaners on your boat or RV, there are a few things you can do to help protect this awesome resource.

Be stingy with cleaners, using only what is needed to get the job done. If it kills bacteria on surfaces, it's going to kill bacteria in sewage, which requires bacteria to break down solids.

Avoid products containing ammonia, sodium hypochlorite (bleach), petroleum distillates, and lye. When necessary, use prepackaged wipes and dispose of in the trash, and always follow label instructions.

Now would be a good time to check your cleaning supplies to see what you can replace on your next order. A good place to start looking for environmentally friendly products is EPA's Safer Choice Program (epa.gov/saferchoice), or look online for directions on how to make your own cleaners using baking soda, vinegar, lemon juice and borax.

Make a Better Place

Every fourth Saturday in September, TVA celebrates National Public Lands Day. This is the nation's largest single-day volunteer event for public lands, and it promotes the recognition of their natural resources and scenic beauty. This year it falls on Sept. 25, but there are plenty of things going on all month. Join us for river cleanups, trail work, or guided hikes. Public lands can include national parks, monuments, wildlife refuges, forests, grasslands, marine sanctuaries, lakes and reservoirs, as well as state, county and city parks managed by public agencies. TVA's public lands and reservoirs are to be enjoyed by all. Last year, we had over 200 volunteers who removed approximately 1,500 pounds of trash, implemented non-native invasive plant species control, and brushed a quarter mile of trail. These events provide a great opportunity to work together to care for our public lands and to increase the visibility of the public lands across the Valley. They also are a chance for a marina or campground to host a cleanup or display National Public Lands Day posters.

Watch What You Are Doing – Fire Safety Month

The sound of a campfire is most intriguing when one lies under the stars on a chilly night. However, if not managed correctly, what is nice and peaceful can become a nightmare in seconds, killing people and animals and destroying landscape.

Firewood can be the cause of fire if not handled carefully. Be sure to use local wood. Bringing in wood from other locations could be transporting disease and invasive pests those areas. Additionally, keeping stacks of firewood below 3 feet in height reduces the chances of its falling and hurting someone. It's a good idea to store wood 10 or more feet away from structures, grills or fire rings. The more wood stored in one location, the greater the distance should be between it and other combustibles. Lastly, use a fire ring to control the size of the fire. Make sure there are no low-hanging limbs nearby.

Nearly all fires are preventable with the right precautions. According to Wildland Fire Management Information, humans cause 85 percent of wildland fires. Human-caused fires result from campfires left unattended, the burning of debris, equipment use and malfunctions, negligently discarded cigarettes, and intentional acts of arson.

Some of the common products that can be made with recycled content include the following:

- Nails
- Newspapers
- Paper towels
- Steel products
- Trash bags

According to an EPA study, for every 10,000 tons of materials recycled, there are nearly 16 jobs created. Additional benefits to recycling include a reduction of waste sent to landfills; conservation of natural resources; and the saving of energy.
