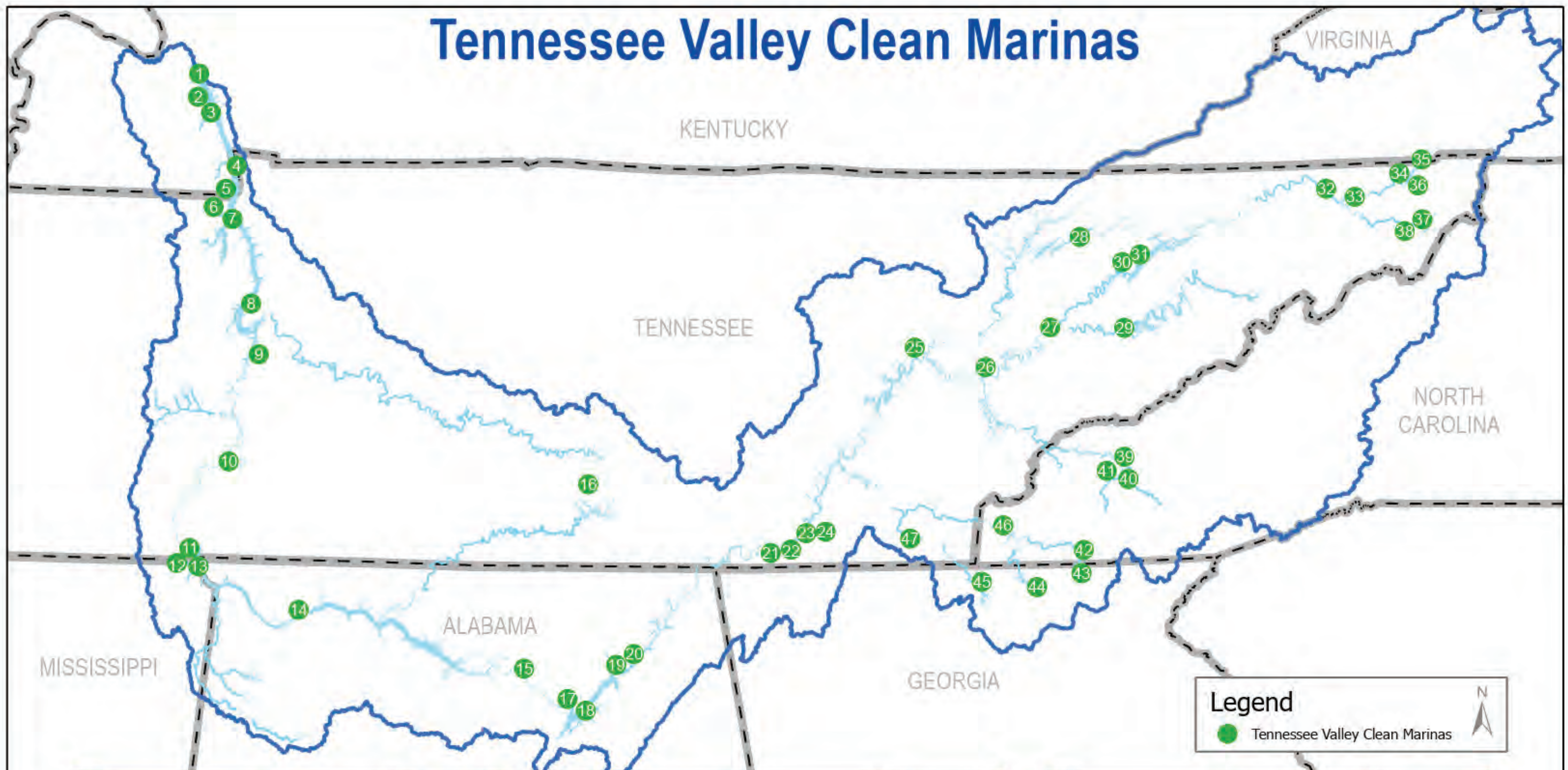

Tennessee Valley Clean Marina Program

The Tennessee Valley Authority created this program to support and recognize marina operators and owners who are voluntarily striving to protect the water resources of the Tennessee Valley and to promote environmentally responsible marina and boating practices. This program is a way for TVA to recognize those marinas that go a step further to ensure clean water is available to future generations.



This program scores marinas on seven topic areas. In each of the categories listed below, a marina must complete 75% of the recommended actions in order to be considered for certification:

Sewage Management

Raw or improperly treated sewage contains chemical and nutrient pathogens. Many of these pose a serious threat to human health and the aquatic environment.

Fuel Management

Spilled fuel creates a barrier to oxygen movement across the water surface, coats the leaves of aquatic plants, discolors boat hulls and dock supports, and deteriorates Styrofoam®.

Solid Waste and Petroleum Recycling/Disposal

Trash and litter can be environmentally damaging and aesthetically displeasing.

Vessel Operation, Maintenance and Repair

Debris, drips, and spills from vessel cleaning, maintenance, and repair can end up in the water when it rains or snows. Paint chips, metal filings, petroleum products, and cleaning solvents can be toxic to aquatic life.

Marina Siting, Design, and Maintenance

Locating marina structures so that they take advantage of existing water and wind currents and natural topography can make property maintenance easier.

Stormwater Management and Control

Storm runoff from parking lots, maintenance and repair areas, and shorelines transports many pollutants to the lake. Some float on the water, and some sink, but they all impact the aquatic environment.

Public Education

A boating public that understands the causes, sources, and effects of pollution is more likely to want clean water to play in.

How to get certified

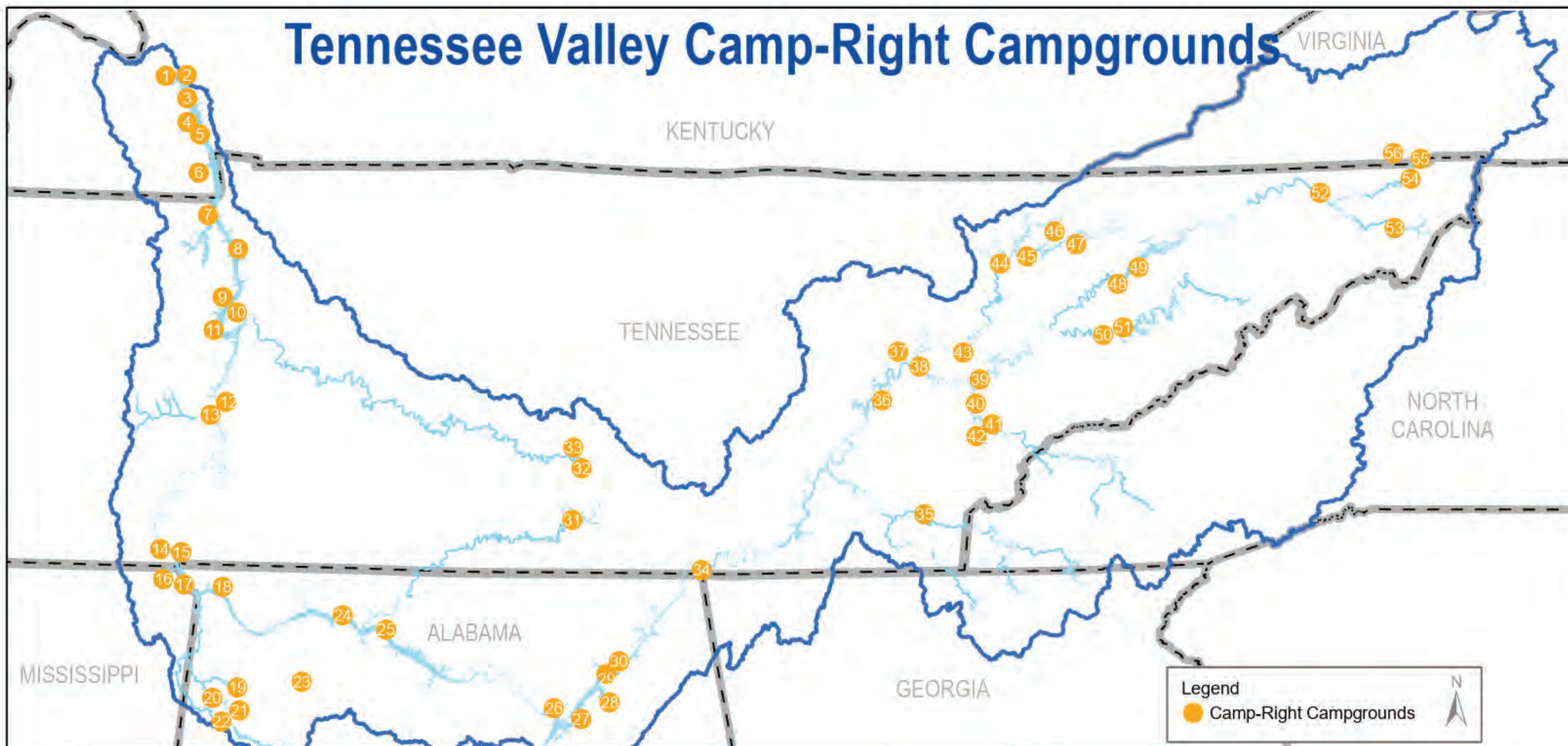
Over ninety marinas have been certified under this voluntary program since it started in 2002. After the first renewal, recertification is required every four years.

Has your certification lapsed? Not sure? Check our website – all currently certified marinas are listed – or review your certificate. Are you interested in getting your certification renewed, or have you never been certified and would like to be?

The process is easy – just give us a call. You can find the guidebook and checklist on our website. Filling out the checklist takes about two hours and TVA staff will be happy to help. More than likely you are already doing many of the actions on the checklist, so don't think it will be expensive to become certified. If you have questions, let us know.

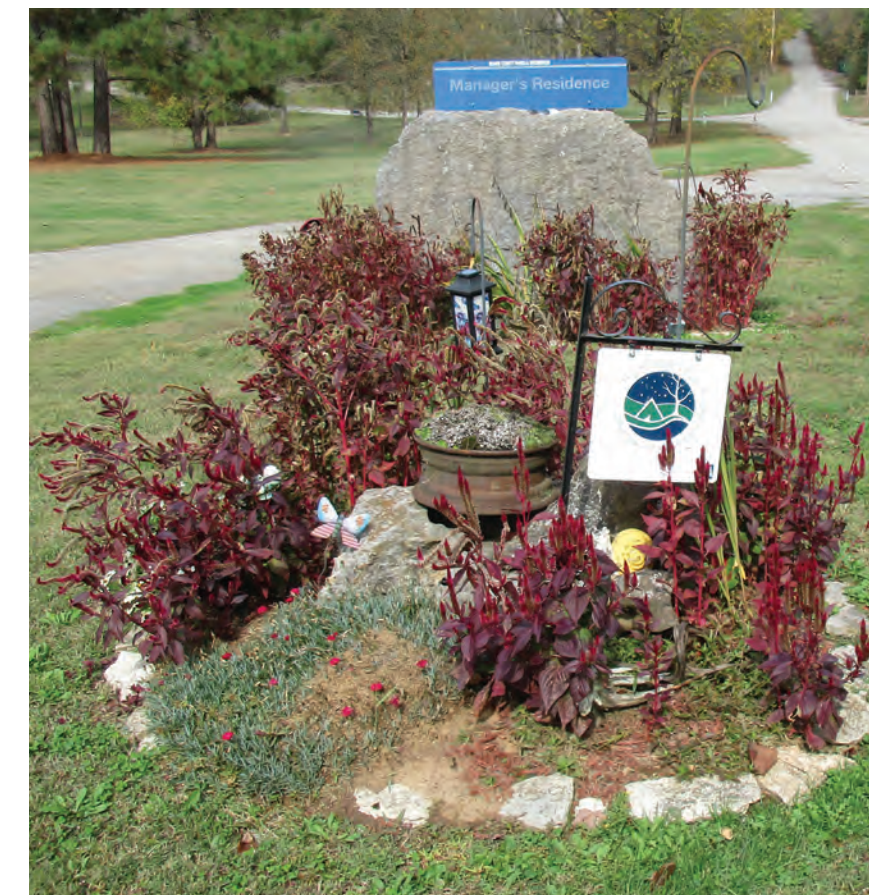

Keep It Clean

Marinas, by the nature of their business, can contribute to pollution, but Tims Ford Marina is determined to minimize their environmental footprint. Certified last year as a Clean Marina, they are doing their part to preserve the water quality on Tims Ford Reservoir. Encouraging their members to properly dispose of trash and utilize the fish cleaning station are two ways they are making a difference.

Did you know that dumping fish parts in the lake can diminish water quality and make the area smell bad? The main problem with dumping those remains in the lake is that it can deplete oxygen from the water and increase the nutrient load, overloading the ecosystem and stimulating algae growth. So next time you decide to clean your fresh catch, utilize a marina with a fish cleaning station so that you can properly dispose of the waste.

Leave Fawns in the Wild and Don't Feed the Deer

Lake Guntersville State Park Campground reminds campers: please don't feed the deer. These actions can compromise the health of the animals and potentially spread disease and parasites. And please do not touch, pet, or move fawns. This campground has become a haven for deer and their fawns. These reminders provided to their campers are an important reminder for all outdoor enthusiasts. Rest assured, if you see a fawn, it has not been abandoned, orphaned, or lost. As an act of protection, a doe leaves her fawn to stay until her return. While the doe is feeding, the fawns avoid detection by hiding motionless in grassy areas. The doe will return to nurse the fawn several times a day. Well-meaning individuals can be harming the fawn by removing it from its hiding place. Please be aware of your surroundings and if you see a fawn or any other young wildlife, to not touch, pet, or move it.

The More You Know

Keeping the river clean is everyone’s responsibility. Some pollutants that enter the water can linger for years, negatively affecting the environment and aquatic wildlife. If you want to make a positive impact, here are a few tips that can help:

- 1) Properly dispose of hazardous chemicals like oils, anti-freeze, paint, solvents, and cleaners. You can check with your county waste management office to find out what types of materials they will accept. You could also use more environmentally friendly alternatives and recycle.
- 2) Leave an unmowed buffer next to streams and lakes. A buffer filters the pollutants carried by rainwater erosion and helps minimize erosion. A buffer of native plants benefits wildlife and can look good.
- 3) Use the trash and not the drain. Never pour or throw anything into a storm drain. It washes straight into the nearest waterbody and can have severe impacts on the aquatic ecosystem. Only rainwater should go down the drain.

How to Trick a Duck? Pretend You’re a Coyote

A flock of geese can quickly ruin clean beaches and shorelines, and damage soil quality. A Coyote Decoy is a visual deterrent to geese and ducks from open spaces, and Tellico Reservoir Development Agency (TRDA) has plenty of open spaces.

All three of TRDA’s campgrounds use coyote decoys to discourage ducks and geese from gobbling up seeds and fresh shoots from wetland plants, reducing the harm to these fragile areas. There is an added benefit to using these decoys: if ducks and geese are discouraged from coming to the shore, well-intended campers won’t be tempted to feed them. It’s a win-win for waterfowl, wetlands, and open spaces. Want to see these decoys in action? Visit to Lotterdale Cove, Notchy Creek, and Toqua Campgrounds in Tennessee where coyote decoys are working 24/7 as campground managers new best friends.

Skimming on the River

While the ultimate goal is to keep litter out of the waterways, the reality is that tons of debris enter the river system daily. Last year, through grants from TDOT and Keep America Beautiful, a network of Seabins were deployed across the state to help collect marine debris from the surface of the water. Each receptacle can remove up to 3,000 pounds of trash from the water per year, including gasoline, oils, and microplastics.

Pickwick Landing State Park Marina is one of the partner recipients who agreed to install and manage the device. The Seabin is situated on the surface of the water and attached to a shore-based water pump on the dock. Water gets sucked into the basket, bringing all floating debris and liquids with it. The water flows through the bottom, trapping the debris inside the device. The Seabin is easy to empty and can work 24 hours a day.

Recycling old fishing line is one of the best actions you can take to solve these issues. With the goal of preserving the water environment, Lauderdale County Parks has installed fishing line recycling bins at their fishing piers, making it easy to recycle fishing line.

You can help protect your favorite fishing spot by building recycling bins and, with proper permissions, install them to collect. Learn how to build a bin and then recycle the contents.

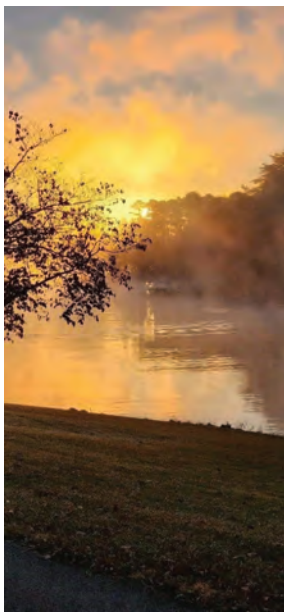

Drop Anchor

If you’re camping in the Tennessee Valley, you might bring a boat or jet ski on your trip. Boaters appreciate the relaxation and fun of fishing or spotting a pretty little cove to enjoy a swim or lunch. There might even be a dock where you could tie up. But Goat Island Campground in Iuka, Mississippi realizes that most often, it’s just a bare shoreline. When that’s the case, they want to remind you to anchor your craft.

Beaching your boat on the shoreline contributes to erosion by loosening the soil. Afterwards, wave action and rain can wash the soil particles into the water. Sediment deposits can alter the flow of the water and reduce water depth, making navigation and recreational uses challenging. Sediment can also clog the gills of fish, reducing resistance to disease, lowering growth rates, and affecting fish egg and larva development.

So, Goat Island Campground says, “Drop your anchor offshore instead of beaching your boat and tying off to a tree. This not only safeguards the delicate balance of riparian ecosystems but also replenishes groundwater, promoting healthier waterways. Choosing pervious ground cover is a proactive step toward sustainable development, ensuring that our riparian zones thrive for generations to come.

Choosing between impervious and pervious ground cover holds significant implications. Impervious surfaces like concrete limit water absorption, leading to increased runoff and potential flooding. When looking at ground cover, consider permeable pavers, native vegetation or even gravel.
