The Pumped Storage Hydro Project Programmatic Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) was released on November 28, 2025. The FEIS included copies of all written comments that TVA received during the comment period on the draft EIS (FEIS Appendix B) aside from 10 comments received on the last day of the comment period. This Errata documents the inadvertent omission of those 10 comments from the comment response table included in Appendix B of the FEIS. The omission resulted from a clerical error during preparation of the appendix. TVA considered these comments and determined that no change to the analysis or conclusions presented in the EIS was warranted. Therefore, TVA has provided responses to these comments in an Errata addition to FEIS Appendix B. Comments and TVA's responses are summarized below. Land Use	Requests TVA to allow the Camp to keep their property (Alternative B)	Emily Organ	TVA has maintained ongoing communication and collaboration with ToKnowHim's Board of Directors. TVA does not intend to cause the closure of the camp. Bare land and the amphitheater are impacted by the project footprint. TVA intends to work with the Camp's Board on plans for continuity of operations and has considered the camp in the layout of the pumped storage facility.

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Land Use	Concern about camp expansion, viewshed impacts, and impacts of flooding with the upper reservoir being close to 3 of their existing campuses (Alternative B)	Living Proof Ministries	TVA has maintained ongoing communication and collaboration with ToKnowHim’s Board of Directors. TVA does not intend to cause the closure of the camp. Bare land and the amphitheater are impacted by the project footprint. TVA intends to work with the Camp’s Board on plans for continuity of operations and has considered the camp in the layout of the pumped storage facility. Flood risk is assessed in 3.17.2.2 of the FEIS. Viewshed impacts are assessed in 3.16 of the FEIS.
Land Use	Concern about the landscape changes and impact to the Camp’s “sacred experience” (Alternative B)	Daystar Church	TVA has maintained ongoing communication and collaboration with ToKnowHim’s Board of Directors. TVA does not intend to cause the closure of the camp. Bare land and the amphitheater are impacted by the project footprint. TVA intends to work with the Camp’s Board on plans for continuity of operations and has considered the camp in the layout of the pumped storage facility.
Land Use	Concern there may be recreation impacts to the Camp (Alternative B)	Summit Crossing Church	TVA has maintained ongoing communication and collaboration with ToKnowHim’s Board of Directors. TVA does not intend to cause the closure of the camp. Bare land and the amphitheater are impacted by the project footprint. TVA intends to work with the Camp’s Board on plans for continuity of operations and has considered the camp in the layout of the pumped storage facility.

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Water Quality	Concern that Rorex Creek PSH (Alternative B) could pose a risk to aquatic ecosystems, water quality and recreational fishing. Requests TVA to revise the EIS to reflect the full scope of the hydrological, sedimentary and biological impacts.	Sydney Lybrand	TVA has developed an in-depth white paper addressing potential groundwater impacts in the area of the Rorex Creek Project Site. The white paper specifically discusses the methods used during exploration and evaluates the likelihood that these activities could affect wells and groundwater. It also addresses the Pisgah City water source, as well as potential impacts from construction and long-term operations. Impacts resulting from the implementation of Alternative B to forests, creeks and wildlife are detailed in Sections 3.2 Vegetation, 3.5 Surface Water Resources, and 3.3 Wildlife. Assessed impacts on wildlife and critical habitats are provided in Sections 3.3.2 and 3.4.2. Impacts to water resources found in Section 3.6.2.2. Informal consultation with the USFWS under Section 7 of the ESA was completed on September 24, 2025, regarding potential impacts to federally listed bats and other federally listed and protected species under the Preferred Alternative.
Land Use	Concern about the loss of the Camp and impacts to the community.	Stacey Riggle	TVA has maintained ongoing communication and collaboration with ToKnowHim's Board of Directors. TVA does not intend to cause the closure of the camp. Bare land and the amphitheater are impacted by the project footprint. TVA intends to work with the Camp's Board on plans for continuity of operations and has considered the camp in the layout of the pumped storage facility.
Cultural	Concern about cultural impacts and	Sydney Lybrand	The unassessed sites, along with the 1,170

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	TVA's inability to access due to "lack of landowner access"		acres that have not yet been surveyed are located outside the area of disturbance for the project and will be avoided by project activities. If it is determined that any additional work is needed within these areas, TVA will conduct further review of those action's effects on historic properties pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, in consultation with the Alabama State Historic Preservation Officer and federally recognized Indian Tribes.
